
Recent Trends in ASYLUM PUBLISHED BY ALLEN MATKINS IN PARTNERSHIP WITH HUMAN RIGHTS FIRST

As part of the Allen Matkins pro bono program, our attorneys have represented a number of individuals and families seeking asylum to the United States. We often partner with Human Rights First in these cases. Given the increase in number of asylum cases the Allen Matkins pro bono program has handled over the last few years, and the growing number of asylum seekers looking to come to the U.S., Human Rights First partnered with us to create this infographic report on recent trends.

While the majority of facts and figures reported on are for affirmative asylum seekers (those who are already in the U.S., or a port of entry and are not facing deportation), others are for defensive asylum seekers (those who are facing deportation, but qualified for a credible fear interview and are seeking asylum) and are noted as such.

Pending Asylum Cases


A marked increase in pending asylum applications nationwide to close out fiscal year 2018.1






Defensive Asylum Application Trends Number of defensive asylum applications filed decreased for

the first time in 10 years after a strong upward trend.1




Affirmative Asylum Application Trends Number of affirmative asylum applications more than doubled

China and Mexico had filed the most affirmative asylum applications for many years until **Venezuela** rose to the top of the list in 2017, a trend that continued in 2018.²



Pending Asylum Cases by Office

Miami, New York, and Los Angeles Asylum Offices had the most cases pending. The majority of Venezuelans seeking asylum are arriving to the U.S. through Florida contributing to the large number of cases pending in Miami.²
